OUR PROMISE

Sask Sport is a volunteer-driven, non-profit organization founded in the early 1970s that serves the amateur sport community and operates Sask Lotteries — the main fundraiser for sport, culture and recreation.

WHAT WE DO

Federation For Amateur Sport In Saskatchewan

Sask Sport's membership includes 78 provincial sport and multi-sport organizations and districts. Sask Sport supports these members with programs and services that help a vast network of volunteers deliver sport opportunities to more than 325,000 participants.

Fundraiser For Sport, Culture And Recreation

Sask Sport operates Sask Lotteries through a licensing agreement with the Government of Saskatchewan. Lottery proceeds are allocated to eligible sport, culture and recreation groups though the Sask Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation. Volunteer committees of Sask Sport, SaskCulture and the Saskatchewan Parks and Recreation Association oversee and make funding decisions, as well as ensure accountability and transparency.

Supporting Volunteers

Lottery proceeds support more than 330,000 volunteers who provide sport, culture and recreation opportunities to communities in every part of the province. Saskatchewan's volunteer-driven system enriches communities and quality of life by giving all people opportunities to learn, grow and play.

\$259 MILLION -RECORD SALES YEAR

In its 2022-23 fiscal year, Sask Lotteries celebrated dozens of major wins across the province.

Thirteen millionaires were celebrated, including a \$1 million win by a group of 52 individuals, which was the largest group win for a prize over \$1 million in the Prairies.

Lottery sales increased in 2022-23 over the previous fiscal year — a result that is made possible through Sask Lotteries' retail partners who play a critical role in supporting the Sask Lotteries fundraiser and its products. In the past year, the LOTTO 6/49 Gold Ball was launched and now offers larger jackpots more frequently.

Additional product enhancements are expected in the next year to further strengthen the Sask Lotteries fundraiser and the proceeds that are available to support sport, culture and recreation organizations.



SASK LOTTERIES COMMUNITY GRANT PROGRAM

The Sask Lotteries Community Grant Program continues to benefit volunteer-led community groups by directly funding impactful programs that enhance the quality of life in communities across Saskatchewan.

This initiative complements the other funding and grant programming delivered by Sask Sport, SaskCulture and the Saskatchewan Parks and Recreation Association and their members. By providing funding at the community level, these grants ensure local priorities are supported and that every corner of the province benefits from lottery proceeds. With this direct funding, community-based organizations are creating opportunities, eliminating barriers and increasing participation.



On June 23, 2022, Sask Sport celebrated its 50th Anniversary with hundreds of employees, volunteers, members, supporters and partners at a street party in downtown Regina.

The event marked a time to reflect on the organization and it's positive impact those involved have made together in communities across the province. Many different people have collaborated with ideas, time and energy to continue to make sport accessible for all, without this dedication, Sask Sport and its efforts wouldn't have been possible throughout the last 50 years.

The **Tony Cote Games** were held this past year for the first time since 2019.

The event, hosted by the James Smith Cree Nation, featured hundreds of athletes competing in seven sports including archery, athletics, beach volleyball, canoe/kayak, golf, softball and soccer.



The **Saskatchewan Winter Games** were held in February 2023, with Regina playing host of the event for the first time in the game's 50 years.

More than 1,500 athletes from the province's nine Districts competed in 16 different sports including futsal and mixed doubles curling, which made their program debut at the 2023 Games.





The Canada Summer Games in August 2022 saw 377 athletes from Saskatchewan representing their province in Niagra Falls. Another 217 athletes represented the green and white in Prince Edward Island in February 2023 at the Canada Winter Games.



























Saskatchewan athletes won **32 medals in the summer and another 20 in the winter**, including three gold medals at each event:

Summer

- Team Saskatchewan, gold in male volleyball
- Savannah Sutherland, gold in female 400-m hurdles
- Jasmine Fehr, gold in female 5,000-m

Winter

- Rylee Miller, gold in artistic gymnastics female floor
- Luca Veeman, gold in long track speed skating male mass start
- Jordan Carroll, gold in artistic gymnastics pommel horse male

Miller and Veeman were also multi-medal winners, with Miller also collecting a silver and bronze medal, becoming Saskatchewan's most-decorated female gymnast in Canada Games history. Veeman brought home a silver and two bronze medals to go along with his gold in speed skating. Serena Dallaire won two bronze medals in long track speed skating.

Along with the athletes, the Canada Summer Games featured 88 coaches, 25 mission staff and 23 officials from across Saskatchewan, while the Canada Winter Games had 74 coaches and support staff, 26 mission staff and 26 officials.

On January 26, 2023, supporters from across the province gathered in Saskatoon for the 2022 Saskatchewan Sport Awards to recognize the success and dedication of those in the province's amateur sport community through two categories – Excellence Awards and Recognition Awards.


Net operating income
